The Entry Fee: **30p** for each exhibit.

Children’s classes **free**. Any child wishing to enter in adult classes may do so at the rate of **30p** per exhibit.

Entries will be accepted at the Hall from **8.30 am** on the morning of the Show.

Entry cards will also be available on the **Friday** before the Show between **6.00pm** and **7.00pm** at the Memorial Hall.

All exhibits must be entered and staged by 10.45 am.

Exhibits 1 to 50 to be labelled with variety, if known.

Exhibits may not be removed before the awarding of show and raffle prizes (approximately 4.00 pm).

Classes 1 – 50 and 107 must be grown by the exhibitor.

No exhibit which has won a first prize at any previous Whiteparish Show may be entered again.

Any competitor who has won the Banksian Medal in the last 2 years is not eligible to win this medal.

In order to avoid disappointments, exhibitors must comply with the wording of the Schedule.

Cash prizes and Certificates will be awarded in each of the children’s classes.

The Garden Club shall not be liable for compensation in respect of loss or damage from any cause whatsoever.

THE JUDGES’ DECISION IS FINAL.

All exhibits, personal property etc. shall be at the risk of the exhibitors.
